What is a geographical entity?



There are different ways to represent a domain (of interest)

There can be multiple, equally valid and overlapping perspectives on a domain

A perspective is an act of cognitively partitioning a domain, an act that draws a mental division between those entities upon which we are focusing on and those which fall outside our (domain of) interest

ISOs can potentially represent any domain different ISOs can represent either the same domain or different domains

no way to represent a domain is in principle excluded any domain can be represented by adopting multiple, equally valid and overlapping perspectives

a representation provides a perspective on a domain not all perspectives are necessarily veridical and/or effective representations of a domain. (Some of them can be veridical and/or effective for some but not for others)

a perspective (also) is involved in outlining a domain every perspective (cognitively) partitions a domain into different entities

no way to partition a domain is in principle excluded no entity is in principle excluded from or included in the partitioning

ISOs' development (entities, partitioning, systematizing, representational primitives)

ISOs' design (procedural approaches, principles, languages)
